
PRELUDE "LAWNS" BY CARLA BLEY

The Bible readings are taken from The Inclusive Bible: The First Egalitarian Translation by Priests for Equality.

Nobody set out to write The Bible. The Hebrew Scriptures were created over many centuries by many people to record the Jewish People's experience of God. The same is true of the Christian Scriptures, some of which were letters written to a specific audience in response to specific needsand were then found to be helpful to the faithful even after fulfilling their original purpose.

FIRST READING DEUTERONOMY 18:15-20

he Lord your God, will raise up for you a prophet like me from among your own people; to that prophet you must listen. It was this that you asked of Yahweh, your God, at Horeb on the day of the assembly, when you said, "Let us not hear again the voice of our God, nor see this great fire again, or we will die." And God said to me, "This is well said. I will raise up for them a prophet like you from among their people, into whose mouth I will put my words, and that person will tell them all that I command. If any person will not listen to the words which my prophet speaks in my Name, I myself will call that person to answer for this. But if a prophet presumes to speak in my Name a message that I have not commanded to be spoken, or speaks in the name of other gods — that prophet will die."

it doesn't come
from the Bible. It is
our way of trying
to listen for God's
ongoing word as it
is spoken outside the
limits of the Bible.
Most often, we turn
to contemporary

I ord— Your good daughter I have been my whole life. I've kept your house clean as sucked bone, starved myself of everything your other children have told me is sin. I've sharpened my teeth on the slate of your Word for your work's sake. Bridled the glint of my tongue so men will feel strong and not be seen trembling under the soft of it. I've behaved and for what do I hunger, myself growing slight on tomorrow's meat: words, words, your words as valued here as Black credit at an all-American bank. The four Gospels hold the core of Christian spiritual wisdom, reflecting the earliest stories and images of Jesus. Like all Scripture, they are not definitive prescriptions but narrative stories requiring endless interpretation.

The sermon invites your curiosity and thoughtfulness about the theme of worship, and is intended to evoke your thoughts rather than direct them. An audio recording of the sermon is posted to the parish website each week, usually by Tuesday.

Like all summaries of historic and communal belief, this affirmation of faith is intended as a symbol of unity and continuity rather than a litmus test of one's individual commitment to a particular dogma.

THE GOSPEL MARK 1:21-28

hey came to Capernaum, and on the Sabbath Jesus entered the synagogue and began to teach. The people were spellbound by the teaching, because Jesus taught with an authority that was unlike their religious scholars.

Suddenly a person with an unclean spirit appeared in their synagogue. It shrieked, "What do you want from us, Jesus of Nazareth? Have you come to destroy us? I know who you are: the Holy One of God!" Jesus rebuked the spirit sharply: "Be quiet! Come out of that person!" At that the unclean spirit convulsed the possessed one violently, and with a loud shriek it came out. All who looked on were amazed. They began to ask one another, "What is this? A new teaching, and with such authority! This person even gives orders to unclean spirits and they obey!"

Immediately news of Jesus spread throughout the surrounding region of Galilee.


PRAYER OF ST. CHRYSOSTOM
