The Bible readings are taken from The Inclusive Bible: The First Egalitarian Translation by Priests for Equality.

Nobody set out to write The Bible. The Hebrew Scriptures were created over many centuries by many people to record the Jewish People's experience of God. The same is true of the Christian Scriptures, some of which were letters written to a specific audience in response to specific needsand were then found to be helpful to the faithful even after fulfilling their original purpose.

The Middle Reading fills the role of a Bible reading, but it doesn't come from the Bible. It is our way of trying to listen for God's ongoing word as it is spoken outside the limits of the Bible. Most often, we turn to contemporary poets for this reading.

Middle Reading author Scott Cairns (b. 1954 in Tacoma, Washington) is an American poet, memoirist, librettist, and essayist. He recently retired as Curators' Distinguished Professor of English at the University of Missouri. He has published nine collections of poetry plus other works. He has been a Guggenheim Fellow and in 2014, was awarded The Denise Levertov Award.

FIRST READING Exodus 12:1-14

od said to Aaron and Moses in the land of Egypt, "This month will be the first of all months to you. You will count it as the first month of the year. Say this to the whole community of Israel: On the tenth day of this month, every family in Israel will take an animal from the flock, one for each household. If your household is too small for a whole animal, join with your next door neighbor, and divide the animal as the number of persons requires. The animal must be a year-old male without blemish. You may take it from either the sheep or the goats. You must keep it until the fourteenth day of the month, then the whole community of Israel is to slaughter it at sunset. Some of the blood must then be taken and applied to the two doorposts and the lintel of every house where the animal is eaten.

"That night you will eat the roasted flesh with unleavened bread and bitter herbs. Do not eat any of it raw or boiled, but roasted over the fire—the head, feet and entrails. You must not leave any over until morning. Whatever is left in morning you are to burn.

"This is how you are to eat it: with your belt buckled, your sandals on your feet, and a staff in your hand; you will eat it in haste. It is the Passover of God. For I will pass through the land of Egypt that night and strike down all the firstborn in the land of Egypt, both humans and animals. I will execute this judgment on all the gods of Egypt: I am God. The blood will mark the houses where you live. When I see the blood I will pass over you, and no harm will come to you when I strike the land of Egypt.

"This day will be for you a memorial day, and you must celebrate it as a feast to God. All generations are to observe it forever as a feast day."

THE GOSPEL MATTHEW 18:15-20

lesus said, "If your sister or brother should commit some wrong against you, go and point out the error, but keep it between the two of you. If she or he listens to you, you have won a loved one back; if not, try again, but take one or two others with you, so that every case may stand on the word of two or three witnesses. If your sister or brother refuses to listen to them, refer the matter to the church. If she or he ignores even the church, then treat that sister or brother as you would a Gentile or a tax collector.

SERMON THE REV. MATT LINCOLN

MUSICAL REFLECTION

AFFIRMATION OF FAITH

We have heard about you,
God of all power:
You made the world out of kindness,
creating order out of confusion;
you made each one of us
in your own image;
your fingerprint is on every soul.
So we praise you.

We have heard about you, Jesus Christ: the carpenter who left his tools and trade; the poor man who made others rich; the healer who let himself be wounded; the criminal on whom the soldiers spat not knowing that yours was the face of God; the savior who died and rose again. So we praise you.

The four Gospels hold the core of Christian spiritual wisdom, reflecting the earliest stories and images of Jesus. Like all Scripture, they are not definitive prescriptions but narrative stories requiring endless interpretation.

The sermon invites your curiosity and thoughtfulness about the theme of worship, and is intended to evoke your thoughts rather than direct them. An audio recording of the sermon is posted to the parish website each week, usually by Tuesday.

This creed comes from the Iona Community, a spiritual community in Northern Scotland and is excerpted from their prayer book, A Wee Worship Book. Like the Nicene Creed that it reflects, it is an expression of faith intended as a symbol of solidarity with other Christians throughout history but not as a pledge of allegiance required for membership. Participate at your own level of comfort. We have heard about you, Holy Spirit:
You broke the bonds of every race and nation,
to let God speak in every tongue;
you made the disciples drunk with grace;
you converted souls and offered a new kind of wealth;
you showed how love makes all things new
and opens the doors to change and freedom.
So we praise you.

COMMUNITY PRAYER: RECEIVING AND RELEASING THE LIGHT OF CHRIST

If you haven't already lit a candle near where you are seated, you are invited to do so now. Spend a moment gazing at it, receiving the light through your eyes, receiving God's assurance that you are loved, as are all the people who are in your prayers. Today's invitation to pray is a riff on the beatitudes by Marion Wright Edelman, adapted for liturgical use. Please say the words in bold type out loud, and as the Spirit moves you to pray, share your concerns and thanks in the comment section.

The Lord be with you.

And also with you.

Let us pray for the Church and for the world.

Blessed are the poor in spirit – who do not measure themselves by money or worldly power but who ask God for what they need and are not mired in pride – walk by our side as we seek the kingdom of God.

Amen.

Blessed are those who mourn – who are concerned about the needs of children and the poor and others in need who cannot speak for themselves – move us to be your comforters.

Amen.

Blessed are the meek – who do not seek only their own good but their neighbors' too – move us to be seekers who share in the gift of God's earth.

Amen.

Blessed are those who hunger and thirst after righteousness — who do not work for the praise of others or earthly gain or fame and share gladly their talents, energy and money — together may we be fulfilled.

Amen.

Blessed are the merciful – who know they are sinners and are dependent on God's and others' forgiveness every minute of every day — guide us as we seek your mercy. Amen.

Blessed are the pure in heart – who are not hypocrites but who struggle to live what they preach – walk with us as we struggle to see the face of God.

Amen.

Blessed are the peacemakers – who do not prepare for war while talking about peace, who do no kill others in order to stop killing, who do not love only those who love them but reach out to make their enemies friends – may we more clearly see ourselves and ALL others as children of God.

Amen.

Blessed are those who are persecuted for righteousness' sake – who do not run or waver in the face of criticism, threats, or death — may we have the courage to speak truth to power.

Amen.

Blessed are those who speak kindly and not meanly of others – who do not tear down others but build them up for the kingdom's work and the well being of ALL – may we be strengthened by God's Love.

Amen.

Blessed are the just – who do not adhere to the letter of the law and regulations for some but ignore them for others – Let us walk together in our struggle so that we may hear God's voice say "well done, good and faithful servant."

Amen.
