

*Nobody set out to* write The Bible. The Hebrew Scriptures were created over many centuries by many people to record the Jewish People's experience of God. The same is true of the Christian Scriptures, some of which were letters written to a specific audience in response to specific needsand were then found to be helpful to the faithful even after fulfilling their original purpose.

FIRST READING Acts 10:34-43

Peter spoke to Cornelius and the others, and said to them, "I begin to see how true it is that God shows no partiality—rather, that any person of any nationality who fears God and does what is right is acceptable to God. This is the message God has sent to the people of Israel, the Good News of peace proclaimed through Jesus Christ, who is Savior of all.

"You yourselves know what took place throughout Judea, beginning in Galilee with the baptism John proclaimed. You know how God anointed Jesus of Nazareth with the Holy Spirit and with power, and how Jesus went about doing good works and healing all who were in the grip of the Devil, because God was with him. We are eyewitnesses to all that Jesus did in the countryside and in

The Middle Reading fills the role of a Bible reading, but it doesn't come from the Bible. It is our way of trying to listen for God's ongoing word as it is spoken outside the limits of the Bible. Most often, we turn to contemporary poets for this reading.

Julia Esquivel Velásquez (1930 - 2019) was a Guatemalan poet, theologian and human rights activist. During her lifetime she received numerous death threats due to her raising concerns regarding the human rights of the Indigenous Maya peoples and went into exile in 1980 in Switzerland. In 1994, she received an Honorary Doctorate from the University of Bern for her poetry.

\* The phrase "inventory since 1954" refers to the year in which the Guatemala government of President Jacobo Arbenz was overthrown by a CIAbacked mercenary army coup, which initiated the unrelenting and evermounting repression by the military regimes who took over power.

Jerusalem. Finally, Jesus was killed, being hung on a tree, only to be raised by God on the third day. God allowed him to be seen, not by everyone, but only by the witnesses who had been chosen beforehand by God—that is, by us, who ate and drank with Christ after the resurrection from the dead. And Christ commissioned us to preach to the people and to bear witness that this is the one set apart by God as judge of the living and the dead. To Christ Jesus all the prophets testify, that everyone who believes has forgiveness of sins through his Name."

What keeps us from sleeping is that they have threatened us with Resurrection!
Because every evening though weary of killings, an endless inventory since 1954,\* yet we go on loving life and do not accept their death!

They have threatened us with Resurrection Because we have felt their inert bodies, and their souls penetrated ours doubly fortified, because in this marathon of Hope, there are always others to relieve us who carry the strength to reach the finish line which lies beyond death. They have threatened us with Resurrection

before, because they transform our agonies and fertilize our struggle, because they pick us up when we fall, because they loom like giants before the crazed gorillas' fear.

because they are more alive than ever

They have threatened us with Resurrection, because they do not know life (poor things!).

That is the whirlwind which does not let us sleep, the reason why sleeping, we keep watch, and awake, we dream.

No, brother, it is not the noise in the streets which does not let us sleep.

Join us in this vigil and you will know what it is to dream! Then you will know how marvelous it is to live threatened with Resurrection!

To dream awake, to keep watch asleep, to live while dying, and to know ourselves already resurrected!

THE GOSPEL MARK 16:1-8

hen the Sabbath was over, Mary of Magdala, Mary the mother of James, and Salome bought perfumed oils so that they could anoint Jesus. Very early, just after sunrise on the first day of the week, they came to the tomb. They were saying to one another, "Who will roll back the stone for us from the entrance to the tomb?" When they looked, they found that the huge stone had been rolled back.

On entering the tomb, they saw a young person sitting at the right, dressed in a white robe. They were very frightened, but the youth reassured them: "Do not be amazed! You are looking for Jesus of Nazareth, the One who was crucified. He has risen; he is not here. See the place where they laid him. Now go and tell the disciples and Peter, 'Jesus is going ahead of you to Galilee, where you will see him just as he told you."

They made their way out and fled from the tomb bewildered and trembling; but they said nothing to anyone, because they were so afraid.
