THE STORY OF JESUS ENTERING JERUSALEM

MATTHEW 21:1-11

s they approached Jerusalem, entering Beth-Phage at the Mount of Olives, Jesus sent off two disciples with the instructions, "Go into the village straight ahead of you, and immediately you will find a tethered donkey with her colt standing beside her. Untie them and lead them back to me. If anyone questions you, say, 'The Rabbi needs them.' Then they will let them go at once." This came about to fulfill what was said through the prophet: "Tell the daughter of Zion, 'Your Sovereign comes to you without display, riding on a donkey, on a colt—the foal of a beast of burden.'"

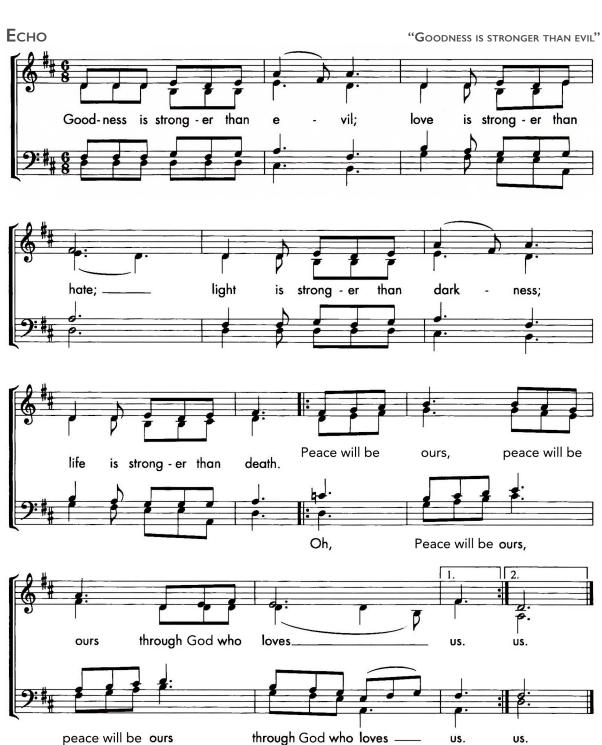
So the disciples went off and did what Jesus had ordered. They brought the donkey and her colt, and after they laid their cloaks on the animals, Jesus mounted and rode toward the city. Great crowds of people spread their cloaks on the road, while some began to cut branches from the trees and lay them along the path. The crowds—those who went in front of Jesus and those who followed—were all shouting,

The four Gospels hold the core of Christian spiritual wisdom, reflecting the earliest stories and images of Jesus. Like all Scripture, they are not definitive prescriptions but narrative stories requiring endless interpretation.

"Hosanna to the Heir to the House of David! Blessed is the One who comes in the name of the Most High! Hosanna in the highest!" As Jesus entered Jerusalem, the whole city was stirred to its depths, demanding, "Who is this?" And the crowd kept answering, "This is the prophet Jesus, from Nazareth in Galilee!"

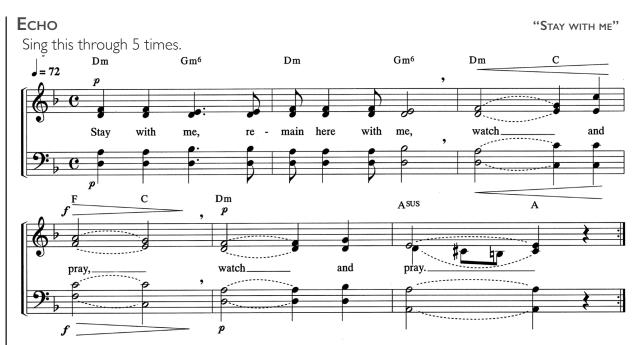

THE PASSION OF JESUS CHRIST

MATTHEW 27:11-54 (ABRIDGED)

Narrator Then Jesus was arraigned before Pontius Pilate, the governor, who questioned him.

Pilate "Are you the King of the Jews?"

Jesus "You say that I am."

Narrator Yet when Jesus was accused by the chief priests and elders, he made no reply. At

the time they were holding a notorious prisoner named Barabbas. So when the crowd gathered, the chief priests and elders convinced the crowds that they should ask for Barabbas and have Jesus put to death. So when the governor asked them,

Pilate "Which one do you wish me to release for you?"

Narrator They all cried,

Crowd "Barabbas!"

Pilate "Then what am I to do with Jesus, the so-called Messiah?"

Crowd "Crucify him!"

Pilate "Why? What crime has he committed?"

Crowd "Crucify him!"

Narrator Pilate finally realized that he was getting nowhere with this—in fact, a riot was

breaking out. Pilate called for water and washed his hands in front of the crowd,

declaring as he did so,

Pilate "I am innocent of this man's blood. The responsibility is yours."

Crowd "Let his blood be on us and on our children."

Narrator At that, Pilate released Barabbas to them. But he had Jesus whipped with a cat-o'-

nine-tails, then handed him over to be crucified.

The governor's soldiers took Jesus inside the Praetorium and assembled the whole cohort around him. They stripped off his clothes and wrapped him in a scarlet military cloak. Weaving a crown out of thorns, they pressed it onto his head and stuck a reed in his right hand. Then they began to mock Jesus by dropping to their knees, saying,

Soldiers "All hail, King of the Jews!"

Narrator They also spat at him. Afterward they took hold of the reed and struck Jesus on the head. Finally, when they had finished mocking him, they stripped him of the cloak, dressed him in his own clothes and led him off to crucifixion.

Nobody set out to write The Bible. The Hebrew Scriptures were created over many centuries by many people to record the Jewish People's experience of God. The same is true of the Christian Scriptures, some of which were letters written to a specific audience in response to specific needs—and were then found to be helpful to the faithful even after fulfilling their

original purpose.

On their way out, they met a Cyrenian named Simon, whom they pressed into service to carry the cross. Upon arriving at a site called Golgotha (which means Place of the Skull) they gave Jesus a drink of wine mixed with a narcotic herb, which Jesus tasted but refused to drink. Once they had nailed lesus to the cross, they divided his clothes among them by rolling dice; then they sat down and kept watch over him. Above his head, they put the charge against him in writing: "This is lesus, King of the lews."

Two robbers were crucified along with Jesus, one at his right and one at his left. People going by insulted lesus. The robbers who had been crucified with lesus ieered at him in the same way.

At noon, darkness fell over the whole land until about three in the afternoon. At that hour lesus cried out with a loud voice,

"Eli, Eli, lama sabachthani?" lesus

which means, "My God, My God, why have you forsaken me?" Narrator

> Once again, lesus cried out in a loud voice, then he gave up his spirit. Suddenly, the curtain in front of the Holy of Holies was ripped in half from top to bottom. The earth quaked, boulders were split, and tombs were opened.

> > (Pause for silence)

Many bodies of holy ones who had fallen asleep were raised. After Jesus' resurrection, they came out of their tombs and entered the holy city and appeared to many. The centurion and his cohort, who were standing guard over Jesus' body, were terrorstricken at seeing the earthquake and all that was happening, and said,

Centurion "Clearly, this was God's Own!"

our judge and our hope.

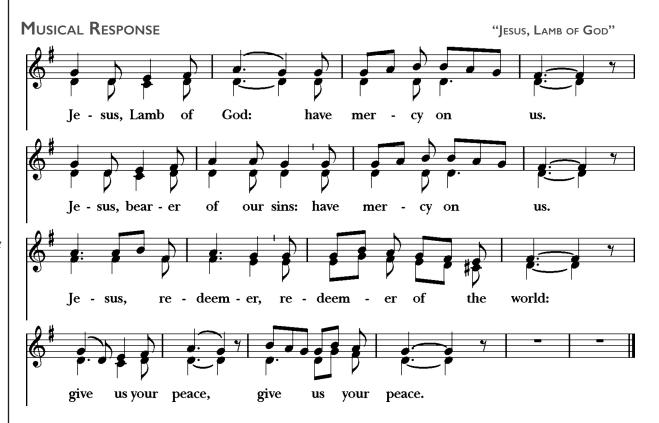
In life, in death, in life beyond death,
